


Demographics of Village Respondents







Good Governance

- Of these, 13% lack policies addressing violence, disability, child rights, or elderly protection.

The highest income generating produce is taro, taamu then ufi (yams) and banana


Village inspections conducted by village committees for example saofaiga matai and komiti a tina.



Data-at-a-Glance

Coverage/respondents: 197 villages; 94 Sui o le Nuu/Malo, 107 Sui Tama'ita'i; Upolu 70% / Savai'i 30%.

Village by-laws: 64.4% registered; 13% lack protections (violence, disability, child, elderly).

Education: 16% no compulsory attendance; 30% report nonattendance due to financial hardship.

Women's leadership: 88% allow women matai; 12% do not (tradition cited).

Household economy: Spend—46% family needs, 30% education, 17% church, 7% village

District engagement: 83.7% attended District Council; 82.3% understand roles; ~18% not in partner programmes.

Local oversight: Matai and women's committees conduct routine inspections and monitoring.

CALL TO ACTION

Close policy & inclusion gaps: Fast-track village by-law updates on violence, disability, child & elderly protection, and compulsory education, paired with hardship support to keep children in school (addresses the 30% financial barrier).

Resource village-led action ("Fofola le Fala") and district coordination: Equip Sui o le Nuu/Sui Tama'ita'i/Sui o le Malo with funding, tools and simple dashboards to implement priorities, and lock in District Council support for training, monitoring and rapid problem-solving.

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
